SUMMARY

Villa Maria School is a nonpublic special education school that is approved by the Maryland State Department of Education. We operate a Type I and Type III school serving day and residential students grades K-8 with emotional disabilities.

The 2023-2024 school year was a very successful year at Villa Maria School. We focused on increasing our census capacity by hiring and maintaining the needed staff to operate II classrooms. We used our CARE and TCI training to keep our students safe and create an atmosphere for them to learn, grow, and heal. We saw a significant reduction in the use of physical restraints, which is just one indicator that our therapeutic supports and services are benefitting our students. We continue to partner with our families to promote the success of our students.
