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ANNA'S HOUSE

CATHOLIC CHARITIES IN ACTION

SUMMARY

With the goal of reducing the number of people in Harford County that return to homelessness, Anna's House serves families and chronically homeless adults through a continuum of services. The purpose of the program is to support some of the most vulnerable people in achieving permanent housing, increasing life skills geared toward self-sufficiency, and reducing barriers that may have contributed to periods of homelessness.

In FY25, Anna's House provided services to 83 of some of the most vulnerable individuals in Harford County, 41 of them being children. The program provided intensive case management services, individualized goal setting, and targeted life skills education that resulted in increased income, benefit procurement, financial literacy, and employment acquisition. We were able to rapidly rehouse 28 individuals and provide housing stability for 30 chronically homeless individuals.

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CARITAS HOUSE ASSISTED LIVING

SUMMARY

Caritas House provides elder adults with a residential assisted living community, with supportive and personalized services including meals, assistance with personal care, medication management, housekeeping, laundry, and social activities. Our full-time registered nurse provides residents with oversight and assessments.

In FY25, Caritas House made several improvements to strengthen our operations and support our team. To improve recruitment efforts, we revised the Elder Care job description to make the position more appealing and marketable to potential candidates. Additionally, we hired a new Billing and Admissions Manager to help ensure we remain in compliance with billing protocols and admissions requirements. These efforts reflect our continued commitment to organizational growth, compliance, and excellence in care.



COMMUNITY HOUSING

CATHOLIC CHARITIES IN ACTION

SUMMARY

The Community Housing programs provide permanent, independent housing with full utilities to both families and single individuals who have experienced chronic homelessness and have a disability. All the housing programs under Community Housing provide supportive case management services for the duration of their enrollment, designed to assist individuals in reaching their self-identified goals while remaining in stable, quality housing in both Baltimore City and Baltimore County.

During FY25, Community Housing provided stable housing with case management support to prevent any family or individual from returning to homelessness. Through these efforts, 78 households with 38 children were able to maintain a safe home in which to reside. During the time of being housed, residents received case management and other supportive services such as access to behavioral health care, access to income benefits, non-case benefits such as SNAP, nutritional food pantry, transportation, life skills, and employment services.

CHRISTOPHER PLACE EMPLOYMENT ACADEMY

CATHOLIC CHARITIES IN ACTION

SUMMARY

Christopher Place Employment Academy is a residential employment academy that invites men to engage in a process of change from homelessness to permanent stable living, preparing to obtain full-time employment, and living a substance free life.

In FY25, Christopher Place Employment Academy provided services to a total of 87 men throughout the year with 23 men successfully achieving capstone and obtaining employment. One hundred percent of the men that successfully completed the employment academy phase of the program participated in a Capstone celebration and obtained employment.

Christopher Place Employment Academy continues to expand its community partnerships that serve as a pipeline to enrollment, training and education. Additionally, Christopher Place Employment Academy has worked in collaboration with Villa Maria Behavioral Health and workforce development to provide 11 of our program participants with their CCAR Certification, which is part of their work towards becoming certified peer recovery specialists.

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ESPERANZA CENTER

SUMMARY

Esperanza Center welcomes immigrants by offering hope, compassionate services, and the power to improve their lives.

In FY25, Esperanza expanded its reach and stood resilient amid major funding and policy shifts. In partnership with two other Catholic Charities programs, Our Daily Bread and Villa Maria Behavioral Health, Esperanza launched the new interdisciplinary Building Hope Dundalk Support Center. In 10 months, the Building Hope collaborative served 1,261 clients, connected 238 to job readiness, and linked 56 clients to therapy. Immigration Legal Services ended the year with 1,151 active cases, continuing a 31-year legacy of life-saving humanitarian representation. Esperanza Health Services welcomed a new Medical Director and established 406 new patients with primary care. Mid-year, the Social Services program closed due to sudden funding loss, ending a decade of case management for unaccompanied children. Yet, thanks to the extraordinary generosity of our shared community, all other core Esperanza Center services remain strong and resilient.

Gallagher Services provides community living and meaningful day supports to adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

We were honored to present the Gallagher Services FY 2025 Strategic Plan and our leadership transition at the MACS Conference and participate in a Transition Cohort of providers.

In collaboration with People On The Go, we developed a training program for people receiving services, focused on Rights & Responsibilities, Abuse, Neglect, & Exploitation, led by Self-advocates. Gallagher also partnered with Johns Hopkins University's SOURCE Project to support people in understanding their diagnoses and adopting healthy lifestyles, culminating in a Health Fair, led by people supported. 20 Front Line Supervisors successfully completed the NADSP Frontline Supervisor Training Program, further strengthening Gallagher's leadership and service delivery capacity. These opportunities reflect Gallagher's commitment to evolving in alignment with person-driven services.

SUMMARY

In FY25, the Compassionate Caregivers and Level Up programs overdelivered on their contracts, training 60 individuals facing barriers to employment to become CNA/GNAs, Certified Childcare Instructors, and auto maintenance technicians. Utilizing a trauma-informed approach, intensive case management, and strong employer and training partnerships, participants consistently achieve high completion and placement rates.

The programs collaborated to support a cohort of 24 CNA/GNA trainees yielding a highly uncommon 100% completion and 100% employment.

Noted by both community residents & community partners for embodying in both its presence & service delivery, the agency's commitment to its values "To Love, To Serve, To Teach & To Work for Justice," MBK was awarded the prestigious Volunteer Site Award of the Year Citation, by St. Peter's Adult Learning Center. This award is given in appreciation of outstanding services in the community to the citizens and providing workforce training and learning opportunities for adults with special needs in West Baltimore.

MBK, in its commitment to empower and create pathways to career success and assist community residents to self-determine and become improved versions of themselves, hosted a Career Fair in June 2025. The Career Fair drew over 119 people from Baltimore City who sought gainful employment.

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MY SISTER'S PLACE WOMEN'S CENTER

SUMMARY

In FY25, My Sister's Place Women's Center renewed its focus on supporting chronically unhoused and vulnerable women who rely on our services daily. Our targeted intervention strategy has included close collaboration with community partners and service providers with the expertise and resources to help women identify safe and stable housing options. For women who are not ready to access shelter or housing, My Sister's Place Women's Center provides a safe, welcoming environment and a wide array of supportive services for women and children seeking respite from homelessness.

Notably, our partnerships with the Mayor's Office of Homeless Services and Health Care for the Homeless have been instrumental in this effort. Together, we've been able to provide critical medical support and present viable housing opportunities to women ready to transition into permanent housing. As a result of this focused effort, 14 women received housing offers with move-in dates scheduled for July and August 2025—a significant milestone in our ongoing mission to end homelessness for the women we serve.

OUR DAILY BREAD EMPLOYMENT CENTER

SUMMARY

Our Daily Bread Employment Center remains committed to caring for those in the community by focusing on services that "Connect Assist Respect and Empower" (CARE) for those whom we serve.

In FY 25, the meal program at Our Daily Bread Employment Center served over 180,617 meals, acting as the first touch point for many encountered. Committed to breaking down barriers beyond food insecurity, the client services department assisted those in need of clothing, personal identification documents and links to other resources including vocational training, GED certificates and expungement needs. Through a new partnership with N'Power, 50 individuals received computer literacy training to help improve their use of common technology. Additionally, hiring fairs were expanded to include both employment and general resources to be able to provide more support to those attending.

In partnership with the Esperanza Center and Villa Maria Behavioral Health, ODBEC launched the Building Hope Dundalk Support Center.

SUMMARY

In November of 2024, our Brooklyn Safe Streets team celebrated with the community and were recognized by Mayor Brandon Scott for over 365 days without homicides. In fact, the zone went 567 days without a homicide since the tragic Brooklyn Day mass shooting in 2023. The success of Brooklyn Safe Streets, in addition to Sandtown, Cherry Hill and Penn North, shows the effectiveness of community violence intervention (CVI). We expanded CVI effectiveness by normalizing youth attendance at school, referring people to work-readiness and housing programs, and promoting behavioral health.

Two of our former Safe Streets site directors also started citywide efforts, including partnering with Mayor's Office of Neighborhood Safety and Engagement (MONSE) in reentry work at Baltimore City Correctional Center with pre-release inmates to provide inperson access to various resources, group discussions, and one-on-one mentoring.

SUMMARY

Catholic Charities Senior Communities owns and operates 24 supportive, affordable apartment communities in Baltimore City, Baltimore, Anne Arundel, Garrett and Harford Counties, including nearly 1,800 units of efficiency, one and two bedroom apartments.

FY25 brought much success to Senior Communities. We maintained a 96% occupancy, serving 2,000 residents and 173 Caring Home Services participants. There are over 1,700 applicants on our waiting list in need of our housing and services. Our services team assisted nearly 1,900 residents with over 45,000 services, including assistance with transportation, meals, isolation prevention, benefits and healthcare services.

Our team designed and delivered many training opportunities, investing in the growth of our colleagues. The results of the Agency Employee Engagement Survey were analyzed, and plans have been prepared to strengthen site teams.

St. Ann Adult Day Services is a medical day program for older adults that provides opportunities for socialization, stimulating activities and medical supervision so that your loved one can continue to live in the community.

In FY25, St. Ann provided medical day services for 78 older adults and those with disabilities allowing these participants to remain living in the community and avoiding nursing home placement. Being awarded the State of Maryland MTA-5310 grant provided the necessary funding for the purchase of 3 new buses and other operational expenses. Participants benefited from the Baltimore City Senior Care Program, allowing low- and moderate-income older adults to attend the program.

This year, we expanded our trauma-informed care psychoeducational program for the families of our youth. It has been very well received and has helped families better understand their children and meet their complex behavioral health needs. We are always looking for opportunities to improve our buildings and grounds, and over this past year these efforts have resulted in significant enhancements to our child safety measures.

One of our underlying beliefs is that children should be with their families, and that the use of residential programming should be brief. This year, over 75% of our youth were discharged to a less restrictive/family setting. We continue to receive consistently positive ratings from our licensing bodies.

VILLA MARIA BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

CATHOLIC CHARITIES IN ACTION

SUMMARY

This year, Villa Maria Behavioral Health continued the growth of our Parent Child Interaction Therapy program. The program has served over 50 new families this year, showing significant impact on child behavior and parent child relationships. Our Frederick County, Baltimore County and Anne Arundel County clinics have received grant funding through Maryland Consortium for Community Supports to provide Family Care Coordination for students who are chronically absent from school. In this first year we served over 220 families with positive outcomes that included increased school attendance and improved access to somatic and behavioral healthcare, and other family resources.

VMBH has worked collaboratively with Esperanza Center at the Building Hope Dundalk Support Center to serve bilingual neighbors in need, following the Key Bridge collapse. We are serving vulnerable Marylanders who otherwise would not receive behavioral health treatment. Lastly, our peer recovery services continue to save lives every day. We provide street outreach to individuals, an effective model of care not offered by most other agencies.

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WEINBERG HOUSING AND RESOURCE CENTER

SUMMARY

In FY25, Weinberg Housing and Resource
Center (WHRC) established a productive
partnership with the Baltimore City Department
of Social Services (DSS). Through the support of
the Mayor's Office of Homeless Services (MOHS),
a selected team of DSS employees now work onsite at
WHRC three days per week with WHRC residents. As a
result, many WHRC residents have been able to successfully submit
applications to be eligible and receive DSS benefits or take advantage of the opportunity to
check the status of an active application.

In FY25, WHRC strengthened its partnership with Healthcare for the Homeless (HCH). No longer providing Convalescent Care services onsite, HCH now provides somatic care to the WHRC residents, twice per week. Any shelter resident with medical challenges can sign up to be seen onsite. The treatment team includes a physician, nurse practitioner, case manager, and a receptionist.
